# **ABOUT YOUTH IN GOVERNMENT**

The Wisconsin YMCA Youth in Government program provides teens with a unique opportunity to learn how to be civically engaged by acting as state legislators, lawyers, justices, and members of the media. Students simulate all phases and positions of the actual state government and are challenged with many of the same issues our real legislators must face in their elected offices.

The program is open to all students in grades 7-12 and engages hundreds of students from across the state each year. During the culminating conference in Madison, participants take over the historic halls and chambers of the Wisconsin State Capitol and Supreme Court. Legislation is debated and court cases are decided as students apply skills they have gained in the program.

YIG is an experience like none other – a fun and immersive three days where students come together to explore ideas, meet new friends from all over the region, find a place where they belong, and leave inspired to take action that makes a difference in thier communities.

# WAYS TO PARTICIPATE AT YOUTH IN GOVERNMENT

# **LEGISLATIVE BRANCH**

Youth Assembly Members and Senators identify state issues important to them, their families, their schools, or their communities and write legislation to improve our state. Delegates present their bills in committee hearings at Pre-Gov and on the Assembly and Senate floors in the Capitol Building in Madison.

# **JUDICIAL BRANCH**

Judicial delegates play the dual role of lawyer and justice. Court members prepare for hearings and make arguments before Youth Justices. Each student will prepare a brief and argue their assigned side of a case, plus have an opportunity to serve on the bench and pass judgment on cases.

### **EXECUTIVE BRANCH**

Comprised of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and Secretary of State, these student leaders are voted in by their peers and serve the state program for the duration of their one-year term.

### MFDIA

Media delegates are responsible for reporting, producing, and publishing several news programs each day via newspaper and digital media. They interact with all program areas and report their findings to students and advisors at the conference.



# **PROGRAM LEADERSHIP ROLES**

Youth leadership is the core of our programs. Youth in Government is planned and led almost entirely by students. Participants have opportunities to serve as leaders who are elected by their peers or as officials who are appointed to help carry out program functions.

**Elected Officers** – Candidates stand for election for one of about 20 leadership roles. Those who are elected make an absolute commitment to Youth in Government and to the students they serve.

**Appointed Officials** – These students are appointed to specialty roles by the Elected Officers to assist in leading the various program areas. Leading up to the conference, students attend various trainings where they prepare for about their specific roles. The application for these roles closes shortly after Youth in Government.

# **MEALS & FOOD**

Most meals are "on your own" during the conference. Students will have access to a variety of food options for meals along State Street and surrounding areas. The State Dinner on Saturday evening is included in the conference cost.

Many bring snacks and light breakfast items to eat in their hotel rooms. We help students identify healthy food options at the restaurants we patronize.

# **CODE OF CONDUCT & DRESS CODE**

YIG programs promote a trust-based Code of Conduct. We expect that all delegates will conduct themselves in a mature and respectful manner. The Code outlines expectations for conduct and possible consequences for not following those expectations.

During program hours, everyone should be wearing business attire.

During evening activities and other personal time, students may dress more casually. The dress code has a wide range of what is considered "business" attire and it is flexible.

# **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS**

# Who runs the program?

Students are involved in the leadership of YIG in meaningful and hands-on ways; for example, student officers who are elected during the previous program year run conference events. YMCA staff members, teachers, alumni, and volunteers are always present to quide from the side and provide support when needed.

# What is a delegation?

Delegations are formed in a school, YMCA, or community group and can vary in size. They are led in partnership by youth and adults. Communications, financial arrangements, and preparation happen at the delegation level.

# How does conference prep happen?

Students gather throughout the fall and winter in local groups—called delegations—where they prepare materials for their program areas, listen to speakers, and practice their presentation skills. In January, delegates from all over the state come together for online Pre-Gov event to present their materials and to get ready for the Mach conference.

# What is included in the program fee?

Two nights' lodging, the State Dinner during the conference, security, meeting space rental, evening activities, training and program preparation leading up to the conference, including a virtual Pre-Gov event in January.

# What is included in the local delegation fees?

These vary by group; see your local delegation director for more info.

# How are adults involved in YIG?

Adults have a variety of roles: some lead delegations while others help conduct trainings, raise funds, and manage logistics. At the conference, they fill various roles to help provide a positive delegate experience.
